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Course position in the study programme:

- general course

Objectives:

- to prepare students for efficient contacts with foreigners that require to speak English (hotel, restaurant, travel agency, etc.). The aim of the course is to teach students to communicate effectively in English in typical situations of everyday life.

Course contents:

A) I year:

- General issues:

1. Names. Verb: *to be*, present simple, genitive, possessive adjectives.
2. Greetings and goodbyes. Verb: *to be*, present simple, days of the week.
3. Nationalities. Verb: *to be*, present simple, countries and nationalities.
4. Objects. Articles, plural nouns, prepositions, colours.
5. Personal information. Names, addresses, cardinal number, age.
6. Skills and abilities. Modal: *can*, modifiers, adverbs of degree.
7. Family. Verb: *have got*, verb: *to be*, past simple.
8. Jobs and lifestyles. Present simple, prepositions.
9. Likes and dislikes. Present simple, object pronouns, verbs followed by *-ing* form.

10. Places. Prepositions of place, compass points, adjectives.
11. Times. Present simple with fixed times, prepositions of time.
12. Routines. Present simple, adverbs of frequency, position of adverbs, linking words.
13. Journeys. Preposition: *by* with means of transport, *from* and *to* with place and distance, conjunction: *because*, question words.
14. The Home. *There is/ there are*. Pronoun: *any*.
15. Present activities. Present continuous, time adverbials.
16. Prices. Question words. Modals: *can*, *could*, demonstrative adjectives, indefinite pronouns.
17. Food and drink. *Some*, *any* and *no* with countable and uncountable nouns. Verb: *need*.
18. Location. *There is / there are* (revised), prepositions of place.
19. Weather and seasons. Mixed tense revision, verb: *to be*, past simple, months and seasons.
20. Past events. Past simple, past time adverbials.
21. Personal property. Possessive pronouns, question word: *whose?*
22. Clothes. Mixed tense revision. Colours and patterns.
23. Future plans. *Going to* future, future time adverbials, making suggestions.
24. Personal appearance. Verb: *have got* (revised), *be like* and *look like*, modifiers.
25. Past events. Past simple: irregular verbs, time adverbials.
26. Dates and arrangements. Modal: *would*, present continuous with future time, time adverbials, ordinal numbers, months of the year.
27. Telephoning. Modal: *can* (request), modal: *will* (decision).
28. Comparison (1). Comparison of short adjectives.
29. Comparison (2). Comparison of longer adjectives.
30. Temporary activities. Present continuous and present simple contrast.
31. Eating out. Modal: *would* (offer), modal: *can* (request), modal: *will* (decision).
32. Recent events. Present perfect simple with *just* (present result).
33. Experiences. Present perfect simple with *ever*, question words.
34. Illness and discomfort. Verb: *have got* (revised) with illnesses, modal: *would* (offer – revised).
35. Things to do. Verb: *have got to* (obligation), infinitive of purpose.
36. Shopping for clothes. *Too* + adjective, modal: *can* (requests), comparison of adjectives (revised), modal: *will* (decision – revised).
37. Instructions. Imperative positive and negative. Adverbs of manner.
38. Rules. Modals: *must*, *mustn't*, *can*, *can't*, *no* + *ing* form.
39. Feelings and emotions. Verb: *feel* + adjective, time clause: *when* + present simple.
40. Biography. Past simple (revised), passive: *to be born*, prepositions of time, time clauses.

- specialized issues:

1. Taking phone calls. Incoming calls. Making simple requests.
2. Giving information. Hotel and restaurant location and facilities. Identifying yourself.
3. Taking room reservations. Requesting information.
4. Taking restaurant bookings. Opening and closing times.
5. Giving polite explanations. Turning down requests.
6. Receiving guests. Guests arriving at hotel reception or restaurant.
7. Serving in the bar. Requests and offers.

8. Instructions. Mixing a cocktail. Giving instructions in sequence.
9. Taking a food order. Restaurant staff taking orders for aperitifs, starters and main courses.

14. Dealing with complaints. Guests complaining in a hotel and restaurant.
15. Jobs and workplaces. Hotel reception and kitchen staff explaining responsibilities.
16. Explaining and instructing. Hotel kitchen staff and instructing trainee.
17. Taking telephone requests. Hotel facilities and services.
18. Taking difficult phone calls. Hotel reception taking difficult phone reservations.
19. Health and safety at work. Hotel assistant manager reading safety regulations.
20. Giving directions indoors. Hotel staff directing guests.
21. Giving directions outside. Hotel staff directing guests.
22. Facilities for the business traveler. Hotel reception explaining conference facilities to a guest.
23. Offering help and advice. Hotel staff dealing with an accident.
24. Dealing with problems. Hotel guests complaining to reception.
25. Paying bills. Hotel and restaurant payments.
26. Payment queries. Hotel and restaurant guests querying bills.
27. Applying for a job. Writing a CV.
28. The interview. A job interview.

B) II year:.

- General issues:

19. Warnings. *Always, never* + imperative, *make sure, don't forget to*. Expressions.
20. Van Gogh. Gerund *-ing* with *after* and *before*. Adverb phrases with *during* and *for*. Linkers: *after that, eventually, finally*.
21. Possibility. Modals: *may, might* (future possibility).
22. Requests and instructions. Verbs: *ask, tell* (somebody to do something). *If* clauses with requests, short phrases with *if*.
23. The senses. Stative verbs.
24. Conclusions. Modals: *must, might, could, can't*.
